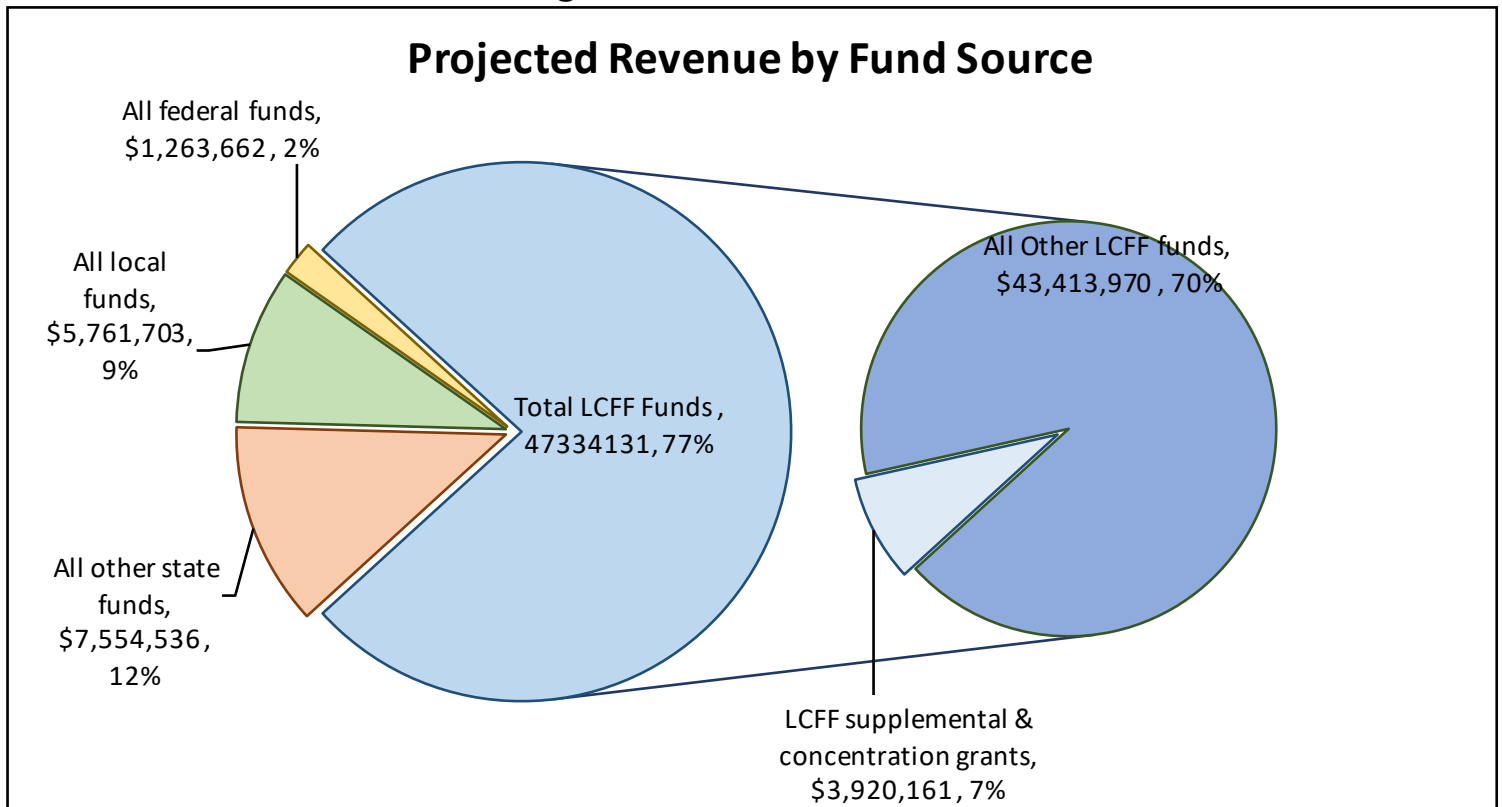

Projected Revenue by Fund Source

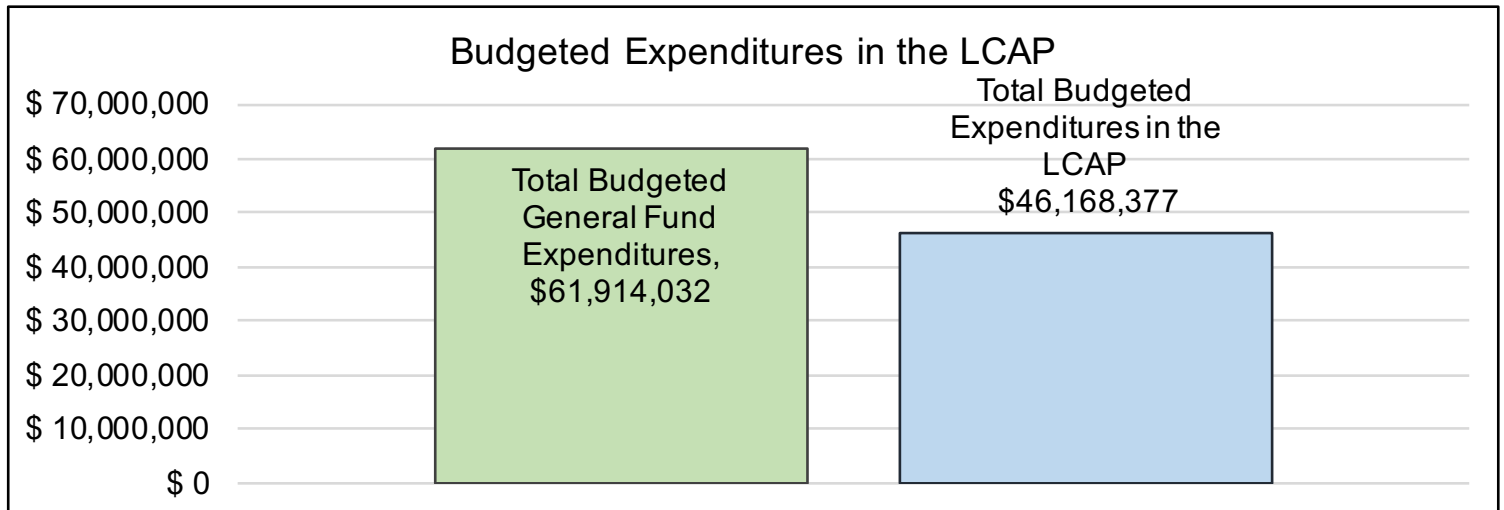


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue iLEAD Hybrid expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for iLEAD Hybrid is \$61,914,131.00. Of this total, \$47,334,131.00 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$7,554,536.00 is other state funds, \$5,761,703.00 is local funds, and \$1,263,662.00 is federal funds. Of the \$47,334,131.00 in LCFF Funds, \$3,920,161.00 is generated based on supplemental and concentration grants for high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

The LCFF gives school districts more flexibility in deciding how to use state funds. In exchange, school districts are required to develop a Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) that will use these funds to serve students.

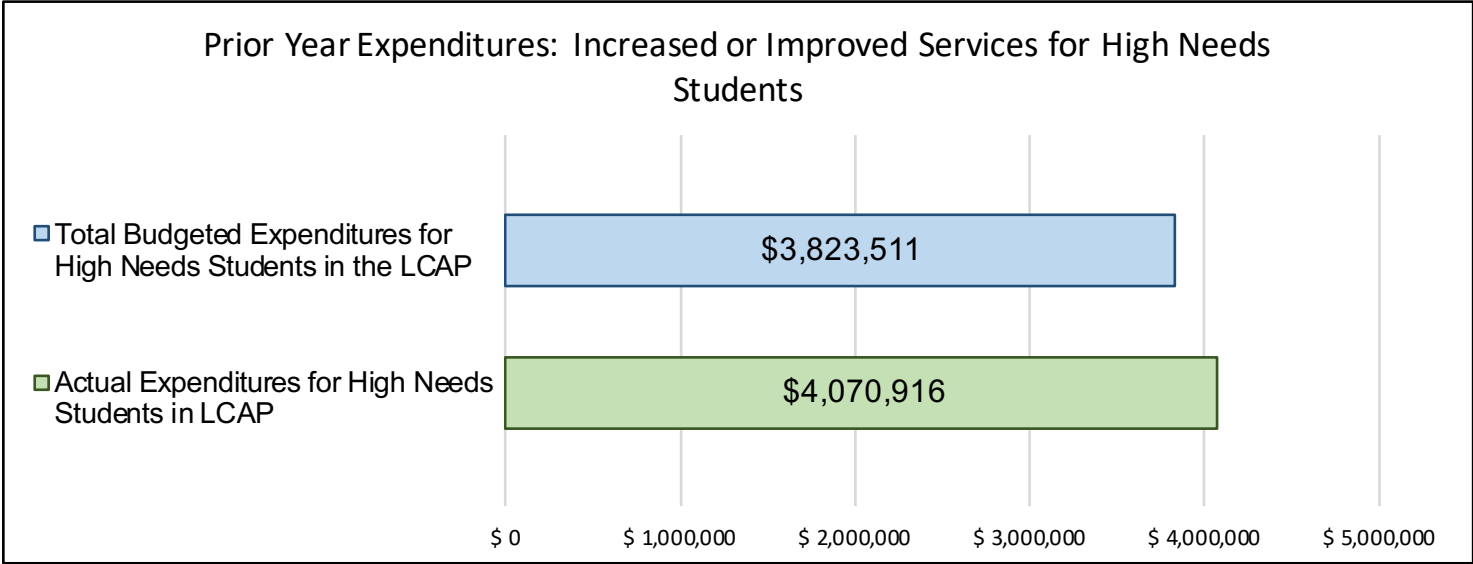

Plan Summary 2026-2027

General Information

iLEAD Hybrid, located in southern California, is a nonclassroom-based, WASC-accredited, public charter school with 3,910 TK-12 learners enrolled during the 2025-26 school year. The school opened in 2015 and serves independent study learners in the counties of Los Angeles, Orange, Kern, San Bernardino, and Ventura.

iLEAD Hybrid offers a learner-centered approach to education that focuses on personalized learning options, interdisciplinary project-based learning at its learning studios, and social-emotional learning principles while adhering to the Common Core Standards. Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) is the process through which children and adults understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. iLEAD Hybrid’s Schoolwide Learner Outcomes were carefully selected to develop the whole child with a focus on both academic and social-emotional learning.

iLEAD Hybrid’s School Programs

1) iLEAD Exploration

iLEAD Exploration is the independent study component of iLEAD Hybrid serving learners in grades TK-12. It is a program that supports educational options and flexibility, as many learners are pursuing outside passions such as sports, theater arts, music, acting, etc. while enrolled in the Exploration program. Exploration meets the needs of families who prefer independent study, personalized learning options for their children under the guidance of a credentialed facilitator. All learners work with facilitators to select a standards-based curriculum that supports their learning style. Additionally, many of the learners take courses at vetted and approved educational vendors throughout Southern California and have access to online courses. The OC Studio serves learners in grades K-8, offering in-person classes twice a week. Science and social studies topics are explored through project-based learning, book studies, and learning fairs.

Through the guidance of academic counselors, Exploration’s high school program continues to prepare learners for college and career through college-prep a-g coursework, AP classes, Career Technical Education (CTE), college credit courses, and other work-based learning opportunities.

The iLEAD Exploration program offers many engaging activities for family involvement. Some of these events include Parent University webinars, a talent show, book clubs, science fairs, and end of year celebrations.

2) iLEAD Antelope Valley Studio

iLEAD Antelope Valley (AV) serves independent study learners in grades TK8. This hybrid independent study option offers interdisciplinary project-based learning under the

guidance of a grade-level credentialed facilitator. Learners attend direct, in-person instruction two days per week at the Lancaster studio. The studio also offers many enrichment activities throughout the year to develop community and showcase learning. School staff cultivates community through school events such as its Fall Festival and Winter Production. This program will sunset in the 25-26 year. Metrics and estimated actuals reflect iLEAD Hybrid with Antelope Valley Studio included. 26/27 actions and budget do not include this program.

3) iLEAD Hybrid Antelope Valley Exploration

iLEAD Hybrid Antelope Valley Exploration utilizes innovative methods of delivering quality project-based and social-emotional learning to independent study learners in grades TK-8. Developed as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and new California charter legislation, the program provides guidance to families who prefer academic support through an independent study program. Learners are assigned a credentialed facilitator according to grade level spans where they utilize projects and a core curriculum. Instructional funds are used to support and enhance each learner's individualized learning plan with extracurriculars and enrichment classes. Workshops are offered twice a week in the areas of art, physical education, STEAM, performing arts, yoga, mindfulness, thematic units incorporating language arts, math, science, and social studies, and remedial help in math and ELA.

All three programs within iLEAD Hybrid utilize thoughtfully designed personal learning environments and have implemented professional learning on diversity, equity, and inclusion. It is iLEAD Hybrid's goal to build an engaging and rigorous educational experience with a focus on each learner's unique strengths to cultivate a love for learning. School staff works with each learner to develop an individualized learning plan with an emphasis on academic and SEL goals. The staff also incorporates a variety of methods and best practices including professional learning, implementation of intentional teaching strategies, analysis of learner performance data, Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS), and the revision of instruction as necessary to educate all learners and address the unique needs of English Learners, Students with Disabilities, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, those experiencing Homelessness, and Foster Youth. At iLEAD Hybrid, personalized learning includes supporting English learners with integrated and designated language support during the school day and Students with Disabilities according to the needs of their individualized education plans providing them with the least restrictive environment possible.

Learner performance and achievement are measured by a variety of summative and formative assessments that are aligned to state standards and reflect proficiency measures required by the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP). To support instructional decision making, the school utilizes NWEA MAP (Measures of Academic Progress), an adaptive assessment tool approved by the California Department of Education (CDE), as one of several measures to monitor learner progress throughout the year.

Depending on the program and grade level span, iLEAD Hybrid also provides numerous school activities and events such as clubs, enrichment classes, workshops, webinars, community events, and aerospace opportunities.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

During the 2025–26 school year, the school's strategic focus areas were intentionally woven into the LCAP framework to drive continuous schoolwide growth and equitable learner outcomes. Academically, the core focus centered on strengthening the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) by anchoring Tier 1 ELA and Math with a standards-aligned curriculum to ensure all learners meet the baseline proficiency floor, while concurrently refining Tier 2 and Tier 3 interventions to effectively close subgroup achievement gaps. This was supported by targeted staff professional development, culture building, and instructional training designed to elevate the quality, consistency, and standards-alignment of Project-Based Learning (PBL) instruction and assessments. To monitor the effectiveness of these instructional practices, the school focused on broad progress goals, prioritizing that learners meet or exceed their projected growth on both the Reading and Math NWEA MAP assessments compared to fall benchmarks, alongside increasing the number of learners performing at or above grade level on the mathematics CAASPP. Parallel to these academic areas, the plan emphasized learner connectedness and support by expanding engagement and interaction opportunities within the school and the community, while implementing proactive safety measures, strengthening communication systems, and using survey data to deepen learners' sense of safety and belonging—all working in tandem to support steady progress toward overall enrollment goals.

A review of iLEAD Hybrid's performance on the 2025 California School Dashboard and local indicators demonstrates significant growth and continuous improvement within our schoolwide academic outcomes and secondary preparation pathways. Notably, the school's College and Career Indicator (CCI) climbed to 48.2% prepared, successfully establishing a Green performance tier and marking a +9.2% increase from the historical baseline. This upward trend matches a substantial expansion in individual student

milestones, with high school a-g graduate completion rising to 41.7% (+23.7% from baseline), students achieving a score of 3 or higher on AP exams increasing to 6.7% (+3.7% from baseline), and the State Seal of Biliteracy climbing to 9.3% (+5.3% from baseline). On state standardized assessments, the school captured widespread, double-digit point recoveries on the CAASPP indicator. All Students advanced by +21.7 points in English Language Arts (ELA) and +26.6 points in Mathematics relative to baseline figures. Multi-tiered gains were particularly pronounced among key subgroups on the ELA assessment, with African American learners growing by +50.5 points from baseline, Students with Disabilities improving by +37.6 points, and English Learners expanding by +30.4 points.

These state-level achievements are closely supported by strong local benchmark progress and an exceptionally stable school climate. On internal growth models, NWEA MAP evaluations demonstrated clear longitudinal advancement, lifting the schoolwide Conditional Growth Index (CGI) by +0.45 in Reading and +0.50 in Math relative to baseline measurements. This growth is reflected in our personalized learning outcomes, with 98.6% of independent study and studio learners successfully achieving their self-identified academic Individual Learning Plan (ILP) goals (+8.6% from baseline). Furthermore, our four-year graduation rate established a highly successful baseline of 92.1%, representing a +3.1% increase from the baseline. This secondary stability is reinforced by foundational school climate indicators, including a high general attendance average of 97.49%, a well-maintained 0% suspension and expulsion rate that preserves an optimal Blue Dashboard status, and local survey data showing that 92.6% of learners feel safe and well-connected to their school community.

In alignment with our continuous improvement framework, the 2025 data sets provide clear operational benchmarks to help the school refine its instructional delivery and target localized student group needs. While All Students achieved double-digit point growth on the CAASPP Math indicator, our English Learner subgroup sits at 69.7 points below standard, representing a -14.3 point variance from their baseline position that serves as a specific focus area for future mathematics support. Similarly, a minor -1.86% shift from baseline on the California Science Test (CAST) and a 43.5% progress rate for English Learners on the ELPAC point to clear opportunities for curricular reinforcement. In our secondary program, bridging the gap between a-g requirements and complete Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways remains an active target, as the dual pathway completion rate currently remains at a 0% baseline. Finally, a minor 0.5% annual uptick in chronic absenteeism (bringing the current rate to 5.4%) and an increase to 18.5% within the African American subgroup provide clear focus points for our ongoing family connection, student outreach, and re-engagement tracking systems.

As part of receiving technical assistance, the school worked with the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) in the spring of 2024 to attend an all-day collaboration to analyze performance ratings and perform root cause analysis for each area identified under Differentiated Assistance. The school has created a comprehensive improvement plan based on root cause analysis in alignment with MTSS intervention systems, evidence-based curriculum, and strong Tier I instruction practices. Data shows that new curriculum, increased intervention, staff PD, and a re-commitment to project-based learning practices are increasing subgroup scores.

As a school of choice, serving the community and the school's educational partners is a vital component of school strategy and operations. The school is committed to the meaningful engagement of its educational partners in the development of the LCAP and is an organic, ongoing process as part of the school's continuous improvement cycle.

Annually, feedback from families, learners, community members, board members, learners staff, and leadership is utilized to evaluate program effectiveness and address the state priorities. Upon careful examination of the input received actions and spending under the school's three goals were maintained, expanded, or modified to further learner achievement and continue the development of program offerings.

During the school year, monthly iSUPPORT meetings were held to provide opportunities for school staff and families to connect regarding the school program. Informal feedback was also received by families through attendance at schoolwide events. ELAC meetings were held in fall and spring to provide an open forum for questions and feedback on the EL program and allow the ELAC to review the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement. Additionally, monthly EL collaborations with the EL coordinators across iLEAD California provided the opportunity for sharing ideas gathered from facilitator and family feedback on how to improve the English learner program.

Twice, learners and staff completed the Learner Outcome survey, a measure of learner growth in the Schoolwide Learner Outcomes and their progress toward academic and social-emotional goals. Additionally, staff and leadership meetings were held monthly to discuss the program, learner progress, and gather/reflect on suggestions for improvements. Parent, staff, and learner surveys regarding aspects of the program were sent in the spring to solicit feedback. These surveys addressed specific aspects of the LCAP (the eight state priorities for developing potential action steps). Various learner clubs allowed opportunities for discussion and feedback.

Monthly board meetings were held with the opportunity for anyone from the public to attend (including staff, parents, and learners) and provide public comment.

Goal Analysis for 2025-2026

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The 25-26 LCAP was implemented as planned with no substantive differences. Overall, iLEAD Hybrid demonstrated substantial positive progress in expanding high school college/career readiness and maintaining stable educational partner networks.

Successes: The school experienced a major postsecondary breakthrough, with the California School Dashboard College and Career Indicator (CCI) climbing to 48.2% prepared, successfully earning a Green performance status, and demonstrating a +9.2% increase from the baseline. Individual high school student milestones grew significantly; graduate a-g course completion escalated to 41.7% (+23.7% from baseline), and student performance on AP exams reaching a score of 3 or higher surged to 6.7%. Dual-enrollment college credit completion remained strong at 35.9%. Operationally, the school maintained its 15 annual educational partner engagement opportunities, achieved stable baseline scores on family welcome perception indicators, and preserved a "good" status on all facility inspection checks.

Challenges: Integrated graduate tracking remains an area for growth, as the percentage of students successfully completing both a-g requirements and a full CTE pathway stayed flat at 0% against a 3% target. While the State Seal of Biliteracy outcome expanded to 9.3% (+5.3% over baseline), Golden State Seal Merit Diplomas slipped slightly to 57% (-2.7% drop). Additionally, teacher misassignments saw a minor upward fluctuation to 0.5, with EL misassignments at 1.3%, though this still represents a vast improvement over the historical baseline of 6.1.

Goal 1 actual expenditures came in \$660,727.00 lower than planned, primarily driven by a drop in general staffing and administrative overhead costs. Material differences between budgeted and estimated actual expenditures, as well as planned and estimated actual percentages of improved services, for the 2025-2026 school year are primarily attributable to a shifting of funding sources for certain key staffing positions, moving staff to federal and other one-time state funds. These changes directly impacted the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) allocations, necessitating adjustments to planned spending. The school's agility in adapting to these financial shifts allowed for the expansion of identified evidence-based initiatives and programs important to the school community.

Highly Effective (Actions 1.1, 1.4, & 1.5): Actions dedicated to facilities and partner collaboration were highly effective at anchoring an inclusive operational baseline, maintaining a near-perfect 95.5% parental involvement satisfaction rate, and preserving extensive family engagement windows.

Effective (Actions 1.2, 1.3, 1.6, & 1.7): Staffing and personalized high school counseling configurations were effective at driving key secondary breakthroughs, including a 48.2% overall green CCI score and a double-digit rise in a-g access. Ongoing focus will be on continuing to increase overall CCI through individualized counseling and high school programming.

Implementation of academic actions yielded exceptional, double-digit growth across both localized internal progress metrics and state standardized testing platforms.

Successes: On the CAASPP assessments, iLEAD Hybrid secured sweeping, multi-tiered gains. All Students grew by +21.7 points in ELA and +26.6 points in Math relative to baselines. Academic acceleration was incredibly prominent within historically underperforming subgroups: African American learners advanced by +50.5 points in ELA and +43.2 points in Math, while Students with Disabilities climbed +37.6 points in ELA and +40.3 points in Math. Local indicators mirrored this success, with NWEA MAP indices showing solid growth over baseline (+0.45 in Reading, +0.50 in Math), and 98.6% of learners meeting their self-identified academic ILP goals. Crucially, the internal English Learner reclassification rate scaled up to 21.2%, beating the 15% target floor by +6.2%. Challenges: Areas for continued instructional focus include a mild downward variance on the California Science Test (CAST), which dipped slightly by -1.86% from the baseline. Additionally, while English Learners achieved major point growth on the CAASPP ELA indicator (+30.4 points), their corresponding CAASPP Math indicator dropped by -14.3 points from the baseline, matching a minor -2.2% baseline drop on the broader Dashboard ELPAC progress indicator.

Goal Analysis for 2025-2026

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The school achieved outstanding marks across whole-child wellness outcomes, schoolwide safety metrics, and secondary completion rates.

Successes: The school maintained a perfect 0% suspension and expulsion rate, ensuring a Blue designation on the California Dashboard. High school graduation tracks showed excellent health, climbing to 92.1% (+3.1% from baseline), while high school dropout rates successfully held steady below the target ceiling at 4.9%. Long-term chronic absenteeism data shows positive progress, staying 1.4% lower than the original historical baseline. Furthermore, local safety survey components improved, with 92.6% of learners reporting that they feel safe, secure, and fully connected to their virtual and studio communities.

Challenges: Minor year-over-year data fluctuations were observed within attendance tracks. General schoolwide attendance fell slightly by -0.39% to a current rate of 97.49%, though it comfortably preserves its position above the 95% state target threshold. Additionally, overall chronic absenteeism crept up fractionally by 0.5% over the past year to a current level of 5.4%. This minor movement was influenced by shifts in specific sub-cohort populations, such as the African American subgroup tracking up from 15.9% to 18.5% and the Homeless youth cohort returning to 30.0%.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Goal 3 expenditures resulted in a net increase of \$361,686.00. This increase was driven entirely by proactive and restorative discipline practices (Action 3.1), which spiked by \$943,897.00 to support our larger learner count. Material differences between budgeted and estimated actual expenditures, as well as planned and estimated actual percentages of improved services, for the 2025-2026 school year are primarily attributable to a shifting of funding sources for certain key staffing positions, moving staff to federal and other one-time state funds. These changes directly impacted the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) allocations, necessitating adjustments to planned spending. The school's agility in adapting to these financial shifts allowed for the expansion of identified evidence-based initiatives and programs important to the school community.

Highly Effective (Actions 3.1, 3.2, & 3.5): Proactive whole-child engagement strategies and multi-tiered SEL protocols were highly effective at preserving an inclusive environment, anchoring a flawless 0% suspension track, and driving a positive 92.6% student safety perception rate. Effective (Actions 3.3 & 3.4): Counseling access and localized support infrastructures successfully guarded secondary stability, directly driving a strong 92.1% graduation rate and suppressing high school dropouts.
